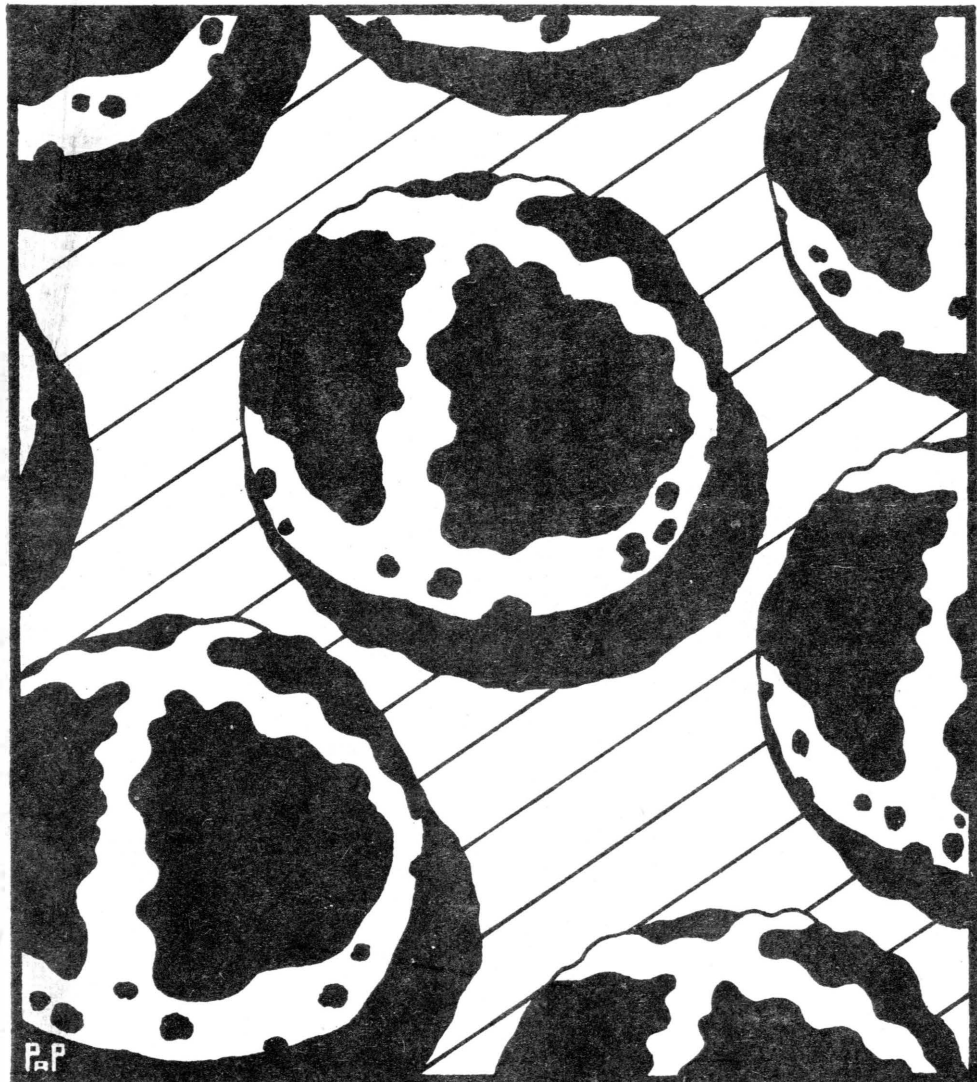

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

The Easter Vigil service (Blisland, Holy Saturday 8p.m.) seldom has the attendance it deserves, although nothing can ever be as important as Holy Communion, which is of obligation for all communicants.

In many places now the Vigil is timed so as to introduce the Easter Eucharist about midnight. The Vigil is dramatic and exciting, with the darker the church the better at the beginning. Darkness and loneliness has been the keynote since Good Friday. Now light bursts in to symbolise the Resurrection of the Lord, as a new flame is kindled in the church porch. The great Easter Candle is lit and carried into the church, with the thrice repeated cry "The Light of Christ". From that light small candles held by the congregation are lit, for our spiritual light comes from Him.

A proclamation is made that Easter has come. The biblical readings, which follow, used to be very long and many, but have now been slimmed down. Easter was always associated with baptism from early days:

We thank you for the gift of water to
cleanse and revive us;
we thank you that through the waters of
the Red Sea, you led your people out
of slavery to freedom in the promised land;
we thank you that through the deep waters of
death you brought your Son, and raised him
to life in triumph.

Bless this water, that your servants who are
washed in it may become one with Christ in
his death and in his resurrection, to be
cleansed and delivered from all sin.

(Alternative Service Book p231)

So the font is blessed, with the Easter Candle,
representing the Risen Christ, standing by.

It is in that wonderful setting and atmosphere
that priest and people renew their baptismal vows in
the knowledge that in the risen Christ they are given
power to keep them, for they pledge themselves to live
not in their own strength, but in his.

If you have not been to this remarkable service before I think you will see what I mean if you come and that you will find it a good preparation for Easter Communion the next day.

Saturday, 2nd April 8p.m. I will explain it as we go.

The Church of England has few enough rules. One rule, however, which we are all obliged to keep, is the one by which we are still bound by the Book of Common Prayer:

"And note, that every Parishioner shall communicate at the least three times in the year, of which Easter to be one".

Burial at St Breward. 17th February, 1983.

Michael Ambrose Cardew.

The next day we buried Michael the Potter sadly and thankfully. He was eightyone and in his long life he had created many beautiful things to enrich the world. He had potted and taught in Africa in two spells, had lectured in the U.S.A., in Australia and in this country, and his honours included M.B.E. and C.B.E. At the service I read, as requested, from Ecclesiastes chapters one and three, a wonderful book (perhaps with some Greek influence, appealing to him as a Classicist, - he read "Greats" at Oxford) about the passing nature of everything "under the sun", but implying that elsewhere, not under the sun, there is much more in the light of the Resurrection.

Oddly enough I remember Michael Cardew from my childhood, and recall how in 1939 he left Winchcombe in Gloucestershire for another pottery which he was beginning in Cornwall. That was Wenford. However, we thought then that things might be alright, for Winchcombe was going to carry on under Mr Finch, - and there was Ray Finch at the funeral, a worthy successor for all this time, who came to pay respects with so many other renowned potters from all over the country. I spoke of craftsmen as makers, creators, who share in the work of Creation working with the earth itself and making beautiful things.

Michael was formidable and kindly, startlingly handsome all his life to the very end, a man of passionate sincerity in his opinions. I remember how gentle and kind he was with the choir children when we took them to Wenford carol singing, giving every one a Christmas orange.

A touching moment at the funeral service was when we brought him out as the Silver Band played the Dead March in Saul. I was grateful to so many people who helped us to make the service, as a visitor was kind enough to say "all so very Michael". Our prayers are with Mariel and the family.

FAR HORIZONS

Extract from a letter from my sister, N.S.W. 19.2.83.

"We have had an extremely hot summer and are now in our fourth year of drought and have been on water restrictions for months. The bush fires, as you may have heard have caused absolute havoc throughout the States, and this weekend all the churches are conducting memorial services for the many lives lost and the many thousands of people who are now without homes.

The last week has been an absolute disaster.

You have to experience being in a Bush fire to know how frightening it can be. I can remember getting John (our brother) over to Mount Kuringai when Vaughn was a baby and Ian (her husband) was out fighting a severe fire all around us and I thought we were going to lose our home.

The same performance happened about four years later when the undergrowth had regrown and the weather was up around the century mark for weeks - and no rain. Only I wasn't so frightened the second time as I knew what to expect and what to do to make things safer.

They have been burned out at Mount Kuringai this year too, only the fires were not nearly as intense as the ones in Adelaide and Victoria.

I was in Melbourne and Dandenong three weeks ago and it was very hot then, with severe dust storms where the top soil was blowing across the paddocks and making it almost impossible to see when driving along the roads.

Hardly any cattle anywhere and the few that could be seen were being hand fed. A pitiful sight, believe me, and we wonder when it will ever end..."

A couple of weeks after this was written there were storms and floods but we haven't heard from Dorothy to find how she fared with that lot. She hopes to come to the U.K. later this year and hopefully we'll get her along to the W.I. to give us another informal chat on life downunder.

THE STORY OF EDITH GALPIN.

Before these days of the Welfare State which now controls our lives, people looked to the church for care and protection. The Blisland church-wardens were powerful men in the village. They supervised the compulsory practice with bows and arrows at the archery butts in the Middle Ages, they were responsible for the re-casting of the bells in the 18th century. They appointed the men to collect the rates for the upkeep of the church, the highways and the care of the poor. They also kept an eye on the morals of the villagers and brought to punishment those who transgressed as is exemplified in the case of Edith Galpin of Temple in 1777.

Her story is told in the history of the church written and published in 1950 by Dr Sidney Madge, father of the Rev.S.W.Madge Rector of Blisland who died in 1968. He writes:- "At the porch door on Sunday, 6th April, 1777, stood a penitent of the neighbouring parish of Temple, whose offences against morals had caused this sentence to be proclaimed in the Court of the Archdeacon on the 21st March, 1777. 'You shall on Sunday April 6th next in the forenoon, immediately after the lesson, enter into the South door of the parish church of Blisland (and on the following Sunday at the same time into the parish church of Cardinham) and walk barefooted, and barelegged, your head uncovered and a white sheet hanging down over your shoulders, and a white rod in your hand, and shall pass through the middle alley of each of the said churches so far as the minister's desk, before which you shall stand until the end of the Nicene Creed; and at the end thereof you are in each of the said churches with an audible voice to say and repeat:- "I Edith Galpin, do humbly confess that I have offended Almighty God by committing foul sin, and being merely a great scandal to the Church and Christian religion, for which I do hereby declare my hearty saviour and penitence, and promise by God's assistance amendment of life for the future, beseeching God to pardon me, and desiring you to pray for me" and thereupon you are with an audible voice to say and

repeat the Lord's Prayer upon your knees."

On the following Sunday Edith repeated the penitential act "openly and audibly and publicly" before the Rector of Cardinham in that church."

According to Sir John Maclean in his history of Blisland, Edith was given a document signed by the Rector of Blisland, Stephen Hickes the church-wardens and certain inhabitants of Blisland and Cardinham stating that she had performed this penance in the two churches. It would appear that old Temple Church was no longer used in 1777 as Edith was not ordered to do penance there. Stephen Hickes, Rector of Blisland from 1718 to 1780 was curate of Temple Church. In 1768 he became blind and was excused from attendance at Temple Church. He was the rector who removed the Elizabethan communion cup and cover dated 1577 to Blisland Church for safe keeping. They were returned to Temple Church when the new church was opened in 1883.

It is at times like these that I really would love to have a few stalwart church-wardens dispensing justice.

The wood pigeon is the ringdove (columba palumbus) This bird is often shot- sometimes unnecessarily I feel. Did H.S. really mean that a pair of turtle doves (streptopelia turtur) visited the garden, or more likely the collared turtle dove (streptopelia decocto)?

In Europe the latter bird was once found only in the Balkan Peninsula, but in fairly recent years it has extended its boundaries over 1,250 miles! It is only found in gardens, parks etc. not in wild woodland.
