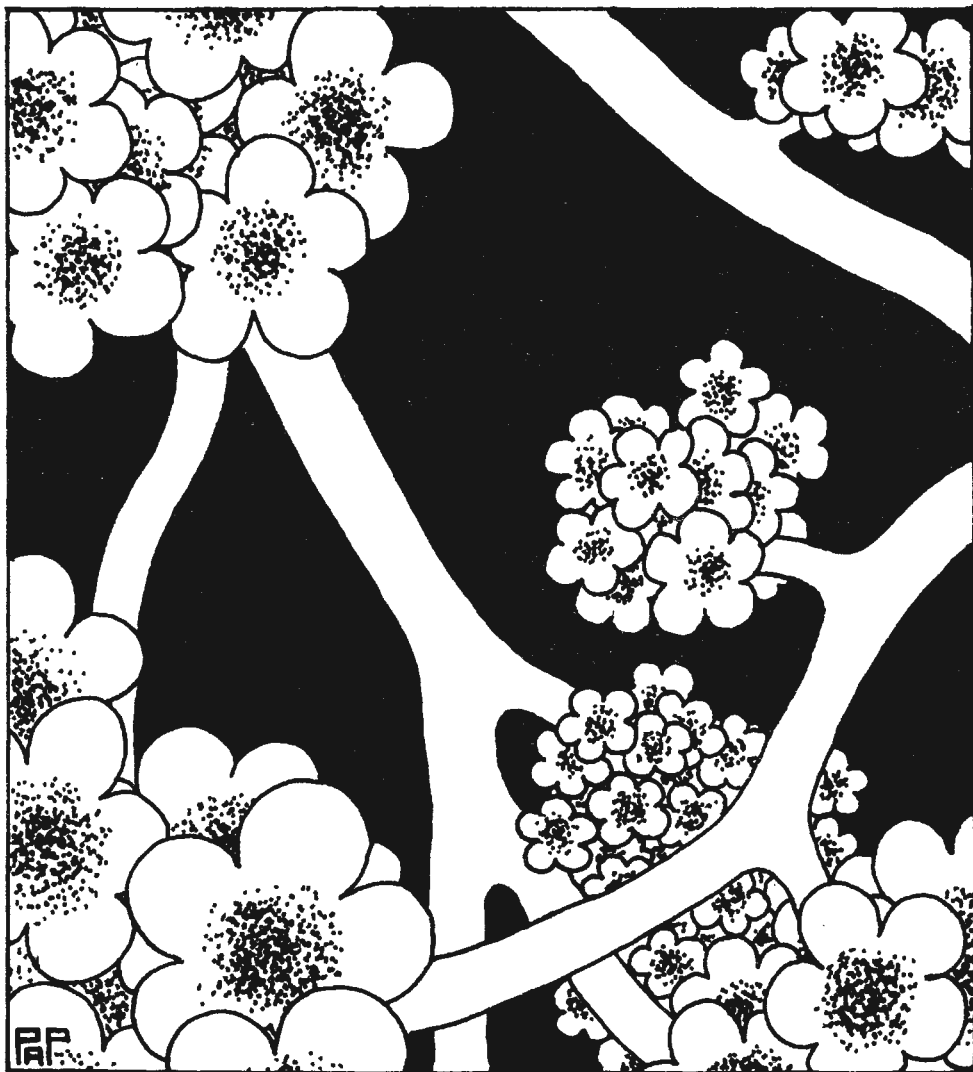

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

By the time this magazine is published it will have been announced officially that I am leaving these parishes in the summer.

I shall be sad to leave the many people who have been kind and good to me, and shall miss the moors, valleys, streams and woods amongst which we live. I shall also miss the churches, all three beautiful in their own way.

Much thought is being given to the future. With such a shortage of occasional-duty priests in this deanery a gap between my going and a successor's appointment is heartily to be avoided. Once such a time began there would be a very long interregnum before an appointment was made. Blisland's difficulty in accepting financial obligations to the deanery and diocese (Common Fund contribution) would not entitle the parish to high priority in the limited supply of priests. That, in its turn would have a damaging effect upon St Breward and the future outlook would be grim indeed.

If, in the circumstances, a way appears for a priest to come here, through much trouble and planning by Bishop Peter, two groups of patrons, the legal experts and a willing priest, then, everyone, be thankful and respond with all your might! Welcome such news and put God first in life from now on, and your own interests last.

One thing more, (and some will want my head on a charger for saying it) that parish money contribution pays for the clergy. Up to now parishes have been featherbedded by endowments and the Church Commissioners. Inflation has now overtaken those resources and parishes have to shoulder an increasing portion of the load. It would be better to let churches fall down than to fail in that obligation, for the Church is people and not buildings, however beautiful. People need priests to enable them to do their work. It would be better still to look after both Church and the churches.

A Walk to Brown Willy.

I found the following article in my bag of 'bits' and thought that now the weather is improving, our readers might better appreciate Donald Bousfield's thoughts.

"It was a lovely summer's day, with hardly a cloud in the sky, believe it or not. And I had no excuse for not making the effort in response to my wife's^a urging - especially when the Rev. Michael Browning had recently scaled the summit. How good to see him so active again!

So we set off from Camperdown (the nearest point by car?), kissing the Middlemoor Cross as we started. The track to Fernacre is bold and almost straight, across pleasantly springy turf, and on the way there are several ancient hut-circles, also the Fernacre stone circle which once had about 65 standing stones, similar to the stone circle at Stannon, which is visible across the moor from Camperdown.

The old Ordnance Survey of the middle of the last century shows the tracks (roads?) which passed up the west side of Roughtor past Arthur's Hall to Landavey and Trevilians' Gate, but few traces seem to remain now.

By courtesy of Mr Peter Throssell, we nosed around the old farmstead of Fernacre, set comfortably beside the de Lank stream, protected by the sloping hillside against the worst of the north winds.

We were interested to note that a barn and hayloft over it are part of the house, and not an addition. We were reminded of Swiss upland farms where the cattle are housed similarly in the winter, providing warmth for the household - I suppose you get used to the smell!

The 1843 Tithe Apportionment schedule shows East Fern Acre as belonging to Richard Doidge Esq., and tenanted by Philip Ham, consisting of arable and pasture land to the extent of 65 acres, to which the Lower Brown "Willey" area of 299 acres may be added.

Close to the farm is a well-maintained "bee-hive" hut, built into a vast slab of moorland stone, big enough to provide shelter for a dozen or more sheep, if required.

We ate our lunch amongst the field-enclosures on the lower slopes of Brown Willy (=Bronwellye, Highest Hill, or Brown Wendy, 1239AD - spell it as you will!), basking in the sunshine. And then we made our way up to the trig point at the top of the hill, where we stood to enjoy the mild breeze, higher than anyone else in Cornwall - unless you count the planes which flew around and the two or three powered gliders which were overhead.

The only people we happened to meet on the summit were a couple who had come from the Jamaica Inn direction. The man recalled that during the last war he had been required to investigate a report that a Liberator plane had pancaked on the tor. With difficulty, in heavy snow he had arrived on Brown Willy to find the aircraft as indicated, but the passengers were all dead and had been there for some six months.

One of the things which we had wanted to examine was another 'bee-hive' hut on the east side of the tor, of which we had seen an illustration in a book printed some fifty years ago. We found it, we think, but the turfed roof appeared to have been removed. No one whom we have met seems to know the purpose of these small "huts" - there are two at Leaze, some more at Casehill and, no doubt, elsewhere, near moorland farms.

There was evidence of the old wolfram mine marked on our map, and we could see how the lower ground on the east of Brown Willy formed a watershed for several streams. And here is Powey-venton or Foywell, the source of the Powey river which goes eastward under Palmer's Bridge on the A30, down the long valley of the Draines River and then over the Golitha Falls towards the south coast.

It is difficult to drag oneself away from the high ground, the top of the world, even though the sunshine haze obscures the view of the sea both over St Endellion and to the far south. But, of course, we did, admiring as we retraced our steps over the moor the efforts made by ECLP to grass over the worst of the Stannon debris.

A short while ago we were exploring some of Dartmoor. Lovely it was, but no more beautiful than these stretches of Bodmin Moor, was it? D.G.B. "

BLISLAND PARISH COUNCIL.

The present Parish Council has almost come to the end of its term of office - four years, and during that time they will have done their best to administer the Village to your satisfaction. So many events have taken place during the past four years and not all of them happy ones.

It was with great sadness we attended the funeral of Mr Harris, a first class Councillor & man of integrity.

It too was with deep regret we had to accept the resignation of Mr Whiteway, again a dedicated Councillor and man of strong principles. So we had to have a bye-election for the two vacancies & with pleasure we welcomed Mr Peter Pengelly & Mr Malcom Price to fill the places.

Another sad event was the loss of the trees on the Village Green through Dutch Elm disease. But they were replaced by other varieties & the majority are flourishing well.

Street lights have been erected in Cassacawn Road, Tregenna Road, Pendrift cross roads and Cassacawn. The long awaited lay-by outside the Council Houses in Tregenna Road was completed, making parking of cars much easier.

Tarmac was laid outside the Institute and Public Toilets making the access to these buildings cleaner & less hazardous. The road near St Pratts Well was widened and the Well itself given a face lift making that area a pleasure to see.

The bungalows at Pen Tor were built and it was nice to see newlyweds occupying the houses vacated by older members of the community, who moved into the bungalows.

The Royal Wedding was celebrated in fine style and Mr Hardy was congratulated on the organisation of Blisland Festivities.

Drainage of many of the roads around the village has been effected and the remainder are to be done during the coming financial year.

Councillors have been involved in many working parties for work on the Village Green and in The Ham. Apart from this we have attended approximately 50 Planning Application Meetings and 10 Site Meetings.

In the face of continuing rising costs & despite the improvements effected, the Council have succeeded in maintaining their share of the rates at a very modest 2p in the £ throughout their term of office.

I would like to thank all the Councillors who have served with me during the last four years. They have all done their very best for the Parish, remembering they are your representatives. It's impossible to please everyone but I sincerely hope we have managed to satisfy most of you.

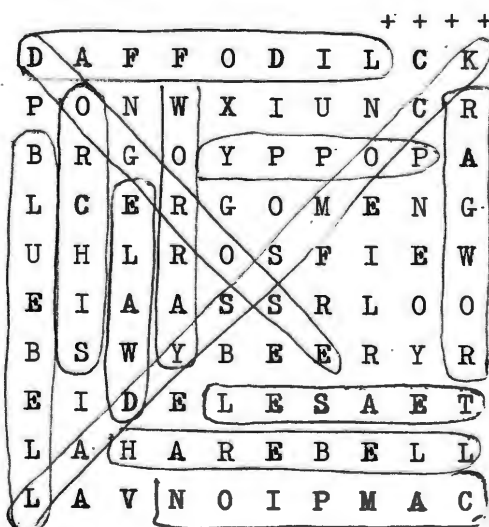

GEORGE RONALD DEWEY.

The gentle man we knew as Major Dewey died on the 21st April, 1982, in a nursing home at Rock, aged 81 years.

After working as an estate manager on a rubber plantation for Dunlop's in Malaya, and on agricultural development in South America - clearing areas ready for the natives to cultivate, he returned to England and came to live in Cornwall in 1937 with his bride.

Because of his life-long love of the Army and previous service in the School Cadet Corps and Malay Volunteer Regiment, he immediately enlisted in the 4th/5th Battalion DCLI (T.A.) as a private soldier and was commissioned later that year. It was always his proud boast that he was the oldest subaltern in the British Army.

On the embodiment of the T.A. in 1939 he served as a company commander with the 4th Battalion until 1940-41, when he volunteered for overseas service and spent the next two years or so with the Royal West African Frontier Force in the Gold Coast.

On his return to England, following a severe bout of dysentery, he spent some time at Newquay as Training Officer to the Home Guard and then as soon as he was fit got himself a posting to Germany to serve with one of the reinforcement holding units for the last six months of the war.

The fact that he was too old to serve with an Infantry Battalion and one of the DCLI Battalion's in particular, was one of the greatest disappointments of his life.

When demobilised he returned to work with the Home Guard in Cornwall as Adjutant/Training Officer until they were disbanded. He then joined the Cornwall Army Cadet Force and commanded the 2nd Battalion until he retired in 1957.

A keen and accomplished cricketer and rugby player in his youth, he retained his love of both these sports throughout his life and was an active member and supporter of the leading clubs in the county.

He had an encyclopaedic memory and was an authority not only on those sports, but also on railways (of the steam era) and on all aspects of the British Army.

Major and Mrs Dewey moved into Newton House, Blisland in 1960 and became involved with local activities. He joined the Parish Council in May 1964 and retired in May 1974. He was elected Vice Chairman in 1968 and served as Chairman from 1970-74.

The Parish Clerks recollection of him is of a 'fatherly person', he was the instigator of the Green Committee, which started to replant in the very early days when it was found that certain trees would need replacing. He set up a Trust Fund for the Green and sold goose eggs to aid the Fund.

Another great love of his was Bentley cars, he was a member of the Bentley Drivers Club which he joined in November 1945 and resigned only in 1980 when advancing ill-health began to restrict his interests.

During many of those years he was an enthusiastic owner of a 4¹/₂ and such was his devotion to the Club that he was for a time Regional Chairman. In 1974 there was a Western Weekend, based in Falmouth, and all the company were entertained to tea at Newton House.

In the early sixties, the activities of the Region fell away badly so in 1964 he called a meeting together at Honiton which resulted in the revival of the Region. Since then it has gone from strength to strength, they owe a great deal to him and remember him with great affection.

The Blisland Village Hall was another interest, he finally retired as Chairman in September, 1974, Having served on the Committee for several years.

I suppose we tend to take people for granted, if we are not a friend or confidant we tend to accept their face value and never pry underneath the exterior - it isn't mannerly. But having heard of the appreciation written in the Journal of the DCLI, "The Silver Bugle", and having read the Bentley Drivers Club Review, I regret not having been more chatty, for I missed knowing a great Character.
