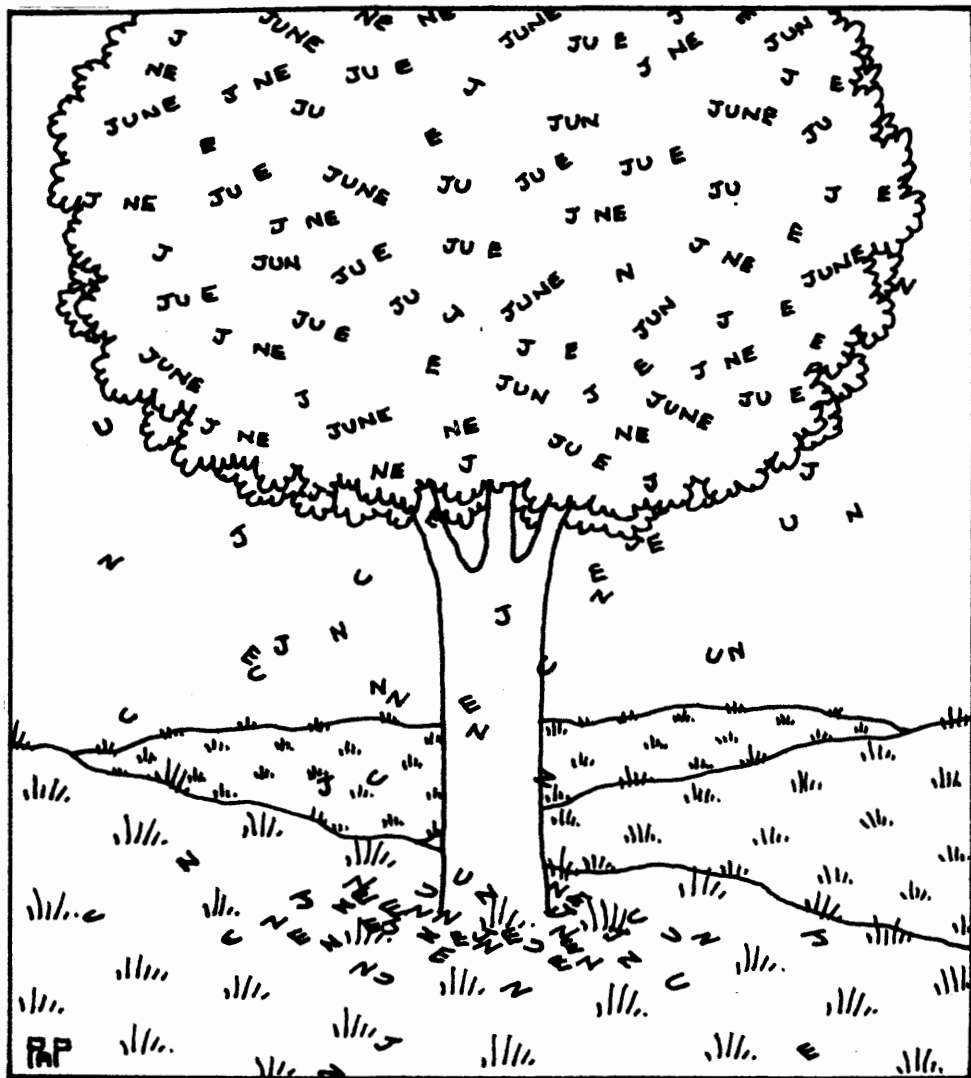

Readers of our May number will have divined that an announcement was imminent, and more or less as we published it came: that the Bishop of Truro has appointed me Vicar of Mylor with Flushing and that the Bishop has also appointed Prebendary Edwin Stark, the present incumbent there, to be my successor.

He is a good and lovely priest of wide experience. In 1981 Bishop Graham conferred upon him a singular honour in appointing him to the Prebend of Marnays in the Prebendal Church of Saint Endellion. I will leave him to tell you more about that.

There are four Prebendaries, one of whom is Rector, and it will be good for him to be near St Endellion so that he can occupy his stall on some of the great occasions which happen there.

What will you call your new priest?

"Prebendary" is used like "Canon" as a title. At this point I will stick my own neck out, too. It always seems to me that to address the priest as "Rector" or "Vicar" when talking to him is a bit like the way in which my maiden great-aunts used to address a man working on a job in the house - "Plumber, would you like a cup of tea?" or "Are you still there, Painter?". As a boy I thought this a bit insulting, denying the poor man his identity under his job. Now, if we can put first things first, and think of the priest as the father of the local church family, feeding them with the sacraments, caring for them and understanding them, then that ought to be expressed WITH and awareness of his identity as a man. So, "Father Edwin" or "Father Conrad" does the trick exactly. It acknowledges him as a priest (and there is no point at all in having priests around if that awareness is not present) and it is also friendly towards him

personally in using his Christian name. Where this habit catches on, I have always found that things are absolutely right between the people and their priest. Here, it also gets you out of the difficulty of remembering which handle to use for him while he is busy being Rector one side of the De Lank and Vicar the other. Prebendary is also a bit of a mouthful.

I have a conscience about a cake. Let me explain.

The Church Fete season is upon us.

The Church of England's income in 1980, the latest year for which figures are published, was 180.7 million pounds, which looks a lot until you work out how far it has to stretch. Of that total, Church Fetes, Gift Days, and special money raising events brought in 25.5 million pounds. Their yield has increased by thirtyseven per cent over two years, but their proportion of total income continues to fall as direct, planned giving increases.

I don't want to confuse everyone with a welter of statistics, but to my feeble mathematics the proportion of "Fete income" to total income in both parishes looks remarkably similar to the national figure.

Our fetes, autumn fairs, coffee mornings and evenings are still the items most heavily relied upon by our devoted Church Treasurers in their budgets. To me that looks like dicey economics with which to saddle our

Parochial Church Councils. A wet day or a robust gale could wreck a year's economy, although I know the sheer goodness and generosity of parishioners would not see us stuck. So then, if this is the chance-y way in which we want to run the finances, how important it is that in the Fetes at Blisland on 18th June and at St Breward on 9th July we GO TO IT with all our might. At St Breward I can't be there as cheer-leader as Sunday, 3rd July will have been my last appearance.

Now comes my problem in the conscience. I arrive at a stall, say, to buy a cake. It's £1. I have thrust down within me all attempts to get the biggest bargain, for this money is going to the Church. It's a perfectly legitimate and fair sale, I'm satisfied about that, and that the cake is good for food, pleasant to the eyes and even possibly to be desired to make one wise (Genesis 3.6) in that it might stir me to make efforts to improve my

cooking. But am I justified, in the course of my giving to the Church, in getting something back by way of such a splendid by-product of my generosity? Ah, says a funny voice, 'Don't forget they wouldn't have had so much jam on the other stall if you hadn't given them some, and there's a tremendous amount of goodwill in this extraordinary process by which goods travel around the village, via the fete, from one household to another for the Church to benefit from the journey. Also, says another funny voice, some people actually like fetes and find them fun, and this is a great social occasion for the village centred round the Church Family. Also, they Church Commissioners do say we got 25.5 million pounds in 1980.

But I still have an uneasy feeling about giving and wanting to get that cake back. It is priced £1. How would it be if I gave £2? Or should I stick to shove-ha'penny. With an aim like mine there's not much fear of getting anything back, there.

No, I've got it. How about a fat donation?

OLVER.C.G.HARRIS.

Olver Harris called over recently and reminisced about his family and times past in Blisland.

His Father, James, was born and later farmed at Abbey Farm, Temple, and is buried at Temple along with his parents and their family. Mother was Maud Hammer, one of three sisters. She died when Olver was very young and he came to live with his Grandfather Hammer at Merrymeeting, later his

Father married sister Phyllis, who still looks after Olver as he never married. The third sister Ivy, married Herbert Webber.

Grandfather Hammer had come from Pentewan and his wife from Polgooth, they had gone to South Africa like so many Cornish people at the turn of the century, but he caught a fever and they returned to farm at Merrymeeting. The sisters were born there, their father later retired to live at Vancot (Morwenna) in Tregenna.

Granfer Hammer was a strong Liberal in Isaac Foots' day, and the then Mrs Edward-Collins' (Grandmother to Brigadier) respect for him was such that she would insist on signing his nomination papers for the Council. Although their politics differed they had a great respect for each other. Charles Hammer stood against Capt. Morshead but the Greenaway family always backed him so he was confident of a block vote. They were the parents Ned, Gladys, Ethel and six others. Farmer Truscott of Penrose was another great supporter.

Having lived at Merrymeeting Olver knew Tresarrett well. Joe Davy and his wife lived at Tresarrett Warf - before Preston Smith's time. Then there was Mr & Mrs Caddy who had a shop at Strulands. George Hooper had the blacksmiths shop below Merrymeeting & the Keat boys lived at the Mill.

Olver attended Blisland school under Mr Hawken, who went to Lostwithiel in 1939. Henry Sturtridge then became Headmaster, and a very fine man he was too. He was in the R.N.V.R. He met Admiral Collins in Gibraltar, but died later in the Aegean Sea. He wanted so much for Blisland after the war but didn't live to achieve it.

Mrs Charles Harris, an aunt, ran the Temple School before it closed, she transferred to Blisland and later married Mr Chapman and retired, whereupon Miss Tucker went in to teach as her replacement. Raymond Harris, a cousin, also became the schoolmaster.

Having left school Olver became apprenticed to George Tucker, Builder and Undertaker. the dual profession in those days in country areas. George Tucker

was a perfectionist and trained the boy well. They would do all the funerals in the village, sometimes finishing a coffin by candle-light. They would travel to their work on push-bikes until at a later date a car was obtained.

In those days there were 'walking' funerals that would require up to four sets of bearers, the more revered you were, the farther they would carry you. There were also wheeled biers. The last local funeral using one was in 1966 from Tregenna.

Olver remembers the Beechtree outside these cottages very well as he put a slatted seat around it, under the ever watchful eye of Mr Tucker!!

Blisland had a good cricket team in pre-war days, captained by Mr Hawken they were winners in a local league. Only three or four players came from Blisland, the rest from St Breward. R.Nankivell was wicket keeper - he died later in the Palestine Police. Frank Harris (another cousin) was opening bat. They played league matches away but had a pitch up Trewint Hill. Play on the Village Green was hazardous as the ball ricocheted off the trees! Olver, being the youngest was 12th man, but always managed to get in the team. Later he went on the strength as a regular and finished up batting 2nd. P.C. Scantlebury & Pip Rawle also played.

Stan and Dick Webber drove the bus to their fixtures and on the return journey it was a custom to stop for a supper of fish & chips for 4d, plus a 2d Vimto, completed the feast.

He remembered too the local shops and craftsmen. Mrs Rich and Mrs Lange had the shop by the Green in those days and they stocked everything, if it wasn't seen it would be produced from somewhere, it was a leisurely place to shop and you never had to be in a hurry. Phone calls were made from the Post Office, Mrs Pearce would get the number then hand over the Phone.

Tom Manaton, apart from being the local road sweeper - and a very good job he made of that too, drains cleared and hedges trimmed - also cut the mens hair. He also repaired boots and shoes in his workshop (now the Price kitchen.). Austin Axworthy in Beechtree Cottage also

made and repaired boots and shoes in a shed that only got removed a few years ago.

Mr Hedley Rich was Parish Clerk and a fund of local knowledge. A reporter was interested in Jubilee Rock and Mr Rich told him that an inscribed plate removed from it was in safe keeping - but it doesn't appear to have come to light recently.

During the Jubilee Celebrations of 1935 a cross country race was held. It was won by Roy Nankivell; it wasn't run entirely to AAA rules, Charley Runnalls put grit down the back of Tommy Roese's shoe as he prepared to start, so Tommy had to stop and empty it out before continuing - all good clean fun!

Olver served in the L.D.V. at the beginning of the war alongside his chums, Charley Runnalls and Wilfie Masters. He had some very funny tales to tell of their exploits, 'Dads Army' must have been based on them.

He had served 4 years of his apprenticeship then was called up. He joined the Warwicks. then later the REME. He went to N.Africa, Algiers and Cassinno, which was razed. When he returned home Mr Tucker had died so he went to work for Turner & Hillery. The family moved to Polyphant in 1947, Mr Harris died in 1953. Olver moved to Launceston in 1966 and specialised in funerals only.

Since 1970 he has served on Launceston Town Council and just recently elected to North Cornwall District Council. In 1974 he became Mayor of Launceston with Mother ably assisting as Mayoress. Being Mayor is quite a privilege as they are the Senior Mayors of the County, having a standard bearer as well as two mace bearers. The photo was taken while he was mayor of the 'Royal & Loyal Borough of Dunheved(Launceston). At any function outside their district they follow behind the host Mayor.

Olver has never had a holiday but has recently taken early retirement, handing over to a younger man. Not that he will idle. He is V.President of Launceston Town Band. V.Pres. of Launceston F.C.&Hon. Sec. to the Lions Club. Along with his Town Council and District Council duties he is also Deputy Mayor.
