FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Congregations in our churches looked a little startled on a Sunday in June when I said in the notices that there would be a service that afternoon on the top of Rough Tor. At the invitation of the 5th Bn. Duke of Cornwall Light Infantry Old Comrades Association it was my privilege to conduct the services on the 43rd Wessex Division Pilgrimage to Rough Tor. On the summit there is a plaque to the memory of the "men of the 43rd" who died in the North West Europe campaign.

Arriving at Rough Tor Ford car park one could look down to the St Breward parish side of the Stannon stream to see the congregation and the reddish uniforms of the Silver Band already crowded round the Standard on the greenn slope beyond the bridge, with the boulder-strewn slope of the great Tor beyond. The Vicar of St Breward welcomed everyone to the parish, reminding them that although the plaque had been placed there in 1954 there had been some hundreds of years earlier on that high spot a chapel of St Michael, Protector of Cornwall.

We sang 'O Valient Hearts', the pilgrims'hymn 'He who would valient be' heard a lesson about the Lord teaching the people, all sitting on a Rough Tor mountain, that happy are those who are pure in heart. We said some prayers and began the climb. Some were transported most of the way by Mr Cyril Greenaway by tractor and trailer, all sitting in rows on straw bales, and his extraordinary skill gave them not so much as a lurch on that rutted and bouldered ground. I suppose another forty or fifty of us kidded ourselves we had the stamina to tackle the steep west face and pretended we were observing the 30th anniversary of the conquest of Everest. I don't recommend cassock and cotta as the best mountaineering gear for leaping from rock to rock. Some visitors gazed in sheer disbelief at this lunatic got up in such a bizarre outfit.

Once there, most of North Cornwall stretched all around us. A little cluster of fflies about two miles away was the Silver Band playing to the crowd who had not climbed. The standard bearer, pole over shoulder, was three-quarters of the way up by now. We stood within a clearly discernable outline of a rectangular building, floored by

flat bed rock, presumably St Michaels Chapel, with the plaque on the inclined stone where the altar might have been. A was laid and more prayer offered. Our girl bugler blew Last Post and Reveille. We were one in worship with those who had prayed there in the ages before us. What did our fellow members of the church, whose St Michael's Chapel was dedicated here on the 12th October, 1419. look like? We know in Blisland what the priest would look like, for on the chancel floor we have the brass of Fr John Balsam in his vestments, nine years earlier. Did they worship up there before that church was built and did the Celtic forebears offer their hill-top Eucharist? What had the Pre-Christians and those of pre-history done there? What would St Breward priests teach there, but that the Eucharist is central to our worship, important enough to gather stones and build the Lord a house better than anyone else's on the crown of the world?

Further, what were those priests like and did my even earlier predecessors come up here? My first recorded one, Ralph, may even have come up here to give his people the Holy Food and offer the Holy Sacrifice in 1201. The priest Osbert was in Blisland then. And how about Thomas de Treverbyn, John Julius and Arceneks of the intriguing name? Then Warin de Sancta Tetha was succeeded by Drogo of the even better name.

Each priest would have taught the faith which I teach. Each one would have his own personality and mind. To be en rapport is strange and wonderful. There is a spiritual wave-length by which priest and people approach one another in establishing a mutual sympathy as though by means of unseen antennae. I am sorry if my own, perhaps rather rum, brand of spirituality and mind, such as it is, has puzzled my people, or, worse, if they have not been aware of it. I wonder how Sir John Cory got on in St Breward and Robert de Beckhamstede in Blisland?

Those Rough Tor rocks, beaten over the years into flattened, pillow shapes by rain and wind, must have looked much the same to Drogo.....For a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday. And I have spent here four years. Ralph 1201. Conrad Ralph 1979.....

and now comes Edwin George John Stark to join us on the lists of the two churches.....

The blessing has been given on the tor. Rough Tors of the Holy Land. Rough Tor of the revealing of God's presence to Moses. Rough Tor of the Transfiguration. Rough Tor of Calvary.. It is time to go down, for you cannot stay on holy mounts for ever, and there is work to be done below.

In the blessing we acknowledged Saint Michael and his angels in a commendation to their care..... and the rustling of the flag as it hissed in the wind was the flutter of their wings.

We are rich in saints in these parishes. Value them. They are our fellow members in the practice of the Faith, and are rather better at it than we are. May Mary the mother of the Lord, Saints Protus and Hyacinth of Blisland, Saint Catherine of Temple, Saint Breward, Saint James of Chapel and all the saints pray for you, my people: may Saint Michael of Rough Tor and all the holy angels watch around and protect you; and God bless you and make you strong in the Faith of his Church.

Thank you for having me with you and for much kindness.

BLISLAND CHURCH.

Blisland Church is made of granite. It was made by the people of the village. The church is 903 years old and the Reverend Sargisson has worked there 4 years. The first vicar that had been there was called Ralph. Ralph did not have a surname because it was so long ago. The church of Blisland has 3 stages in history. Stage 1, the church was built by the people of the village in Norman times and it was small and dull. Stage 2, the church was extended in the latefourteen hundreds and in the early fifteen hundreds. The roof had carvings of short angels and other faces of people when it was extended. Also the pillars started to lean to one side because people used to be buried under the foundations. It was 3 shillings and 4 pence to be buried under the floor and then it went up to 5 guineas and five shillings and people didn't have them buried there so much because it was too much money. In Stage 3 they put an oak beam to stop the pillar from leaning and they also dug up all the bones they could find and put them in a big grave outside the church which ha "unknown but well known" written on it, that meant only God knew who they were. What I thought was interesting was that the door up to the tower was very short but that was because people were very short because they didn't eat the right food. All the graves were outside except for one that is inside the church. It has a carving of a man wearing clothes on and this carving is carved in brass. It is the second oldest brass in Cornwall. The oldest is only one year older.

BLISLAND'S CROSSES

In his book "Ancient Crosses and other Antiquities of East Cornwall" J.T.Blight in 1858 described many crosses to be found in Blisland and its neighbourhood. The most well-known are St Pratt's Cross near Church Bridge, two crosses in the churchyard, and the cross outside the Post Office near the junction of the roads leading to Tregenna and Tresarrett. Near this cross are metal fixtures used by the blacksmith in his work. He lived in the house opposite the Post Office still called The Smithy.

Crosses were often placed at cross-roads. In an old map of 1700 a cross is shown at Cassacawn at the top of Waterloo Hill and another at the crossroads leading to Pendrift. The name "Whitty Cross" given to the cross-roads from Blisland to Cardinham, Bodmin & Tresarrett - commemorates the time when a cross known as White Cross stood there by the hedge. The cross was taken to Trewardale in 1831 when Captain Edward Collins succeeded to the estate.

Another cross at Trewardale originally came from St Breward where it stood by the wayside between Lower Lanke and Penpont. Sir John Maclean wrote in 1868 that the cross had been thrown down and damaged. The head was found by the Rev. Charles Edward-Collins on a heap of stones being broken up for repairing the roads. He had it removed to Trewardale. The base has never been found and is supposed to be still somewhere on the original site in St Breward. The head is round with a cross in relief on either side, and has a hole in the back, possibly for the insertion of an iron lug indicating that the cross had probably been used as a gatepost.

There are three crosses at Lavethan - one was said by Sir John Maclean to have been removed from the Blisland moors - the others were originally used to mark the Lavethan boundaries. They are shown on an old 19th Cen. map at Lavethan. One stood at Lavethan gate and marked the S.W. boundary of Blisland Green. This cross is a plain Latin Cross and was later moved to a hedge on the East side of the house. The other stands near this cross at the foot of a steep bank. It has a round head with an incised cross carved on either face.

There are three crosses at Tregaddick - one is believed to have come from Lavethan. It was found originally by the roadside near the Logan Stone on Carbilly Tor. It is probably the cross referred to in a letter from Quiller Couch to T.J.Blight in which he wrote "There is a cross at Lavethan which Captain Morshead has placed on the top of a gable end of one of his stables. It was taken from the moors near Bradford". It was later removed to Tregaddick by Sir Warwick Morshead.

A second cross could possibly be one mentioned by Sir John Maclean in 1868 as standing near the gate leading to Lavethan Mill at the junction of the roads by Tressarrett Bridge - half a mile from Tregaddick. A third cross much mutilated was once used as a gate post. It has four holes in the shaft for iron staples or hinges. It could possibly have been a wheel cross discovered by a Bodmin man at Penvorder near Lower Lanke, St Breward by the side of a hedge in a lane near a cottage at the beginning of the 20th Century.

There are other crosses on Bodmin Moor usually marking boundaries. Peverell's Cross on Trehudreth Downs near the lay-by on the main A30 road now stands against the hedge and is difficult to recognise as a cross being much worn by weathering. When J.T.Blight saw it nearly 150 years ago he described it as a circular headed cross in relief and three rectangular projections extending beyond the head - similar to St Pratt's Cross and characteristic of the Blisland and Cardinham crosses. It was renamed after the ancient Cornish family of Peverell who lived at Park in Egloshayle, but the connection with the family is not known. It stands by the side of an old track or causeway over the moor from Blisland to Cardinham which led over low lying marshy ground below St Bellarmin's Tor.

Another cross known as "Shorta Cross" served as a boundary mark between the parishes of St Neot and Temple. It may now be among the fragments preserved in Temple Churchyard.

The base of a third cross is on Brockabarrow Common near Shallow Water Hill on the A30. Another cross along the A30 towards Bolventor is marked on the map as Four Hole Cross just past the road leading to Lord's Waste and Warleggan.

The Ordnance Survey maps show the sites of many of these ancient crosses Peverell Cross - Four Hole Cross - Middle Moor Cross near Camperdown, St Breward - the remains of a cross near King Arthur's Hall and a cross near Higher Lank. I was once told by an archaeologist, Dorothy Dudley, that crosses were used to mark tracks across the moors to guide pilgrims to St Petroc's Chapel on Rough Tor. I wonder how many of these old crosses ended up as gate posts or as rubbing posts for cattle. R.C.

ST BREWARD PARISH COUNCIL.

On June 7th, the Chairman, Mrs D.Hannaford welcomed Mr Raymond Hoskin, a new member, to his first meeting.

The cutting and clearing of the major Footpaths is now in operation and it is hoped that doing the job early and again later will be of benefit instead of once as in previous years.

The Police have agreed to spend more time in the Village following reports of damage to the 'phone boxes, public toilets at Row (the cleaner now has to call every other day) and the bus shelter seat at Lank, which the Council has decided not to replace.

The County Council is giving consideration to possible improvements to off-peak Bus Service in Rural areas, the extra trips to Bodmin from St Breward being Tuesdays & Fridays, depart Blisland 09.30, St Breward 09.45.

Depart Bodmin 12.30. The Parish Council has decided to pass on this information for comments as to whether this would be of benefit or completely useless.

Many complaints have been received by Council Members of public nuisance caused by cattle straying from the Common at Ryland down through the village. The Council is seeking legal and other advice and it would seem that under the Animals Act, Liability for damage and expences due to trespassing can be claimed, although at the moment with better waether and more feed the animals are more content.

After many requests Wenford Hill has been resurfaced, and it is hoped that the hedges and boulders in Tuckingmill Hill will soon receive the Divisional Surveyors attention. On the agenda for next month - Play areas at Ryland and Penvorda.
