

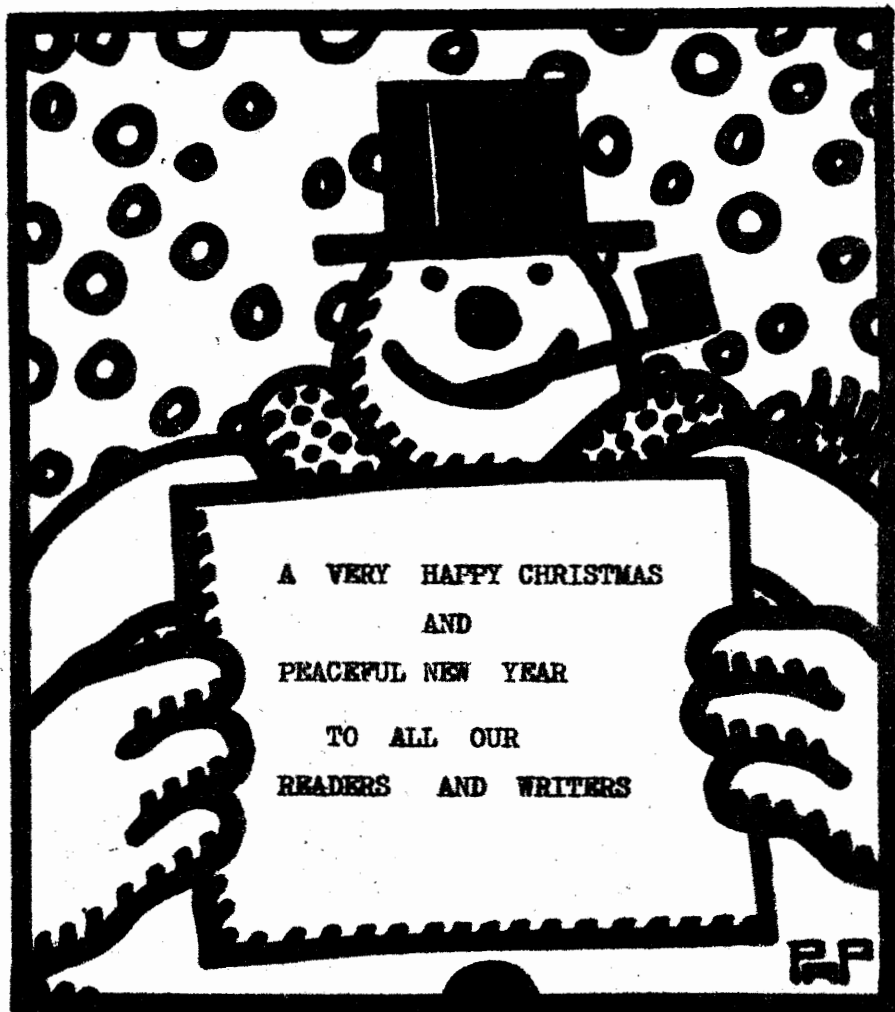

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

My dear Parishioners of Blisland, St Breward and Temple,

There has been a bit of an upheaval at the Rectory recently. A central heating system has been installed and whilst the work was in progress I had to be around getting rooms ready and acting as a tea-boy which took up time from some of my pastoral duties. Sister and I would like to keep open house on Tuesday, December 13th at 7pm and hold a Coffee Evening. A warm welcome, in both senses, awaits you all. The Coffee Evening at the Mansion House was not only a social success thanks to the kindness of our hostess but also it raised money for the Church. I hope that the Coffee Evening at the Rectory will also be a social success and raise some more money for the Church.

Twelve days later we shall all keep the great feast of Christmas. In the sixteenth century there lived one Thomas Tusser who wrote a book called Five Hundred Points of Good Husbandry and in the section The Farmer's daily Diet are to be found the well known lines:

At Christmas play and make good cheer,
For Christmas comes but once a year.

It certainly does and people generally take Thomas Tusser's advice. So much so that Christmas has become more and more secularised and commercialised. As Christians, however, we must remember that Christmas - Christ's Mass - celebrates the birth of the Saviour of the World Who came down from Heaven and died upon the Cross in order that we might go to Heaven. He did this for love of us and we must show our love for Him by coming to Midnight Mass or to a simpler form of that Mass on Christmas morning. Then, having been to Church, we can look forward to our traditional Christmas Dinner and entertainment.

Not everyone, of course, can make good cheer. There are many who are impoverished or undernourished, many who are unwell at home or in hospital, many who are lonely or sad. We must think of them just as we must remember that the Christ Child was born in humility and poverty in a stable with the animals around and the first

visitors to join in honouring and worshipping the Holy Child were simple shepherds. Looking down from Heaven, however, were the Angelic Host rejoicing that God Incarnate was born. When we come to Church at Christmas we worship the Christ Child in the company of all the Angels and Saints in Heaven. It is a wonderful feast but we must realise what it is all about. We must prepare ourselves to receive the Christ Child into ourselves. Here is a prayer, from a Christmas hymn, which we can use:

O holy Child of Bethlehem,
 Descend to us, we pray;
 Cast out our sin, and enter in:
 Be born in us today,

We hear the Christmas angels
 The great glad tidings tell:
 O come to us, abide with us,
 Our Lord Emmanuel.

A holy and blessed Christmas. God Bless you and all whom you love,

SOME HYMN WRITERS.

At an earlier meeting of the Mother's Union this year a speaker discussed with us some of the more popular hymns, encouraging us to read them quietly to obtain a greater understanding of their content and the beauty of their poetry.

It occurred to me later that we know little about the authors and their lives. This fact prompted me to find out something of the background of some hymn writers.

Hymns have done more than most men's words in carrying comfort and joy to the hearts of people in sickness and sorrow, in danger and anxiety.

One of our grand old hymns "Let us with a gladsome mind, Praise the Lord for he is kind" was written by a boy! Millions of people have sung it during the last 300 years. It was written by John Milton the great poet when he was only 15, studying at St Pauls' School.

One very famous hymn writer was Isaac Watts, born in Southampton in 1674. Isaac's father was a schoolmaster, a deacon of the church and twice experienced a prison sentence for his religious beliefs. Isaac was the eldest of his 9 children, also he was the smallest. Because of his size he experienced plenty of bullying which resulted in his writing:-

"Were I so tall to reach the pole
And grasp creation in my span.
I must be measured by my soul
The mind's the standard of the man."

One morning during prayers Isaac laughed when he saw a mouse run up the bell rope. His father demanded an explanation which Isaac answered in rhyme.

"There was a mouse for want of stairs

Ran up a rope to say his prayers." The outraged father took a stick by way of punishment, dropping on his knees Isaac pleaded "O father, father, for pity sake, And I will no more verses make."

Five years later Isaac expressed his disappointment at the collection of hymns being used in church.

'Then my boy' suggested his father, 'make better ones'.

This started Isaac on his life's work of writing 600 hymns. In times of national crisis or victory we sing his famous hymn "O God our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come." Isaac died in 1748.

Augustus Montague Toplady was born at Farnham in Surrey in 1740, but spent many years in Somerset. He became well known because of his experience in Burrington Combe near Cheddar Gorge. Whilst he was the curate of the parish of Blagdon, Somerset, he was out walking when caught in a violent thunderstorm. He noticed a crevice in a large rock in the beauty spot. While sheltering there he compiled the words of the hymn "Rock of ages cleft for me, Let me hide myself in thee".

Toplady wrote it on a playing card which someone had dropped and this heirloom is said to be preserved in a museum in America. The Prince Consort requested this hymn to be sung a few hours before he died. Toplady died in 1778.

John Keble was born in Fairford, Gloucester in 1792, won a scholarship to Corpus Christi College, Oxford at the age of 15 years. Ordained in 1815, John Keble was a nature lover, one of his most popular hymns "Sun of my soul, thou saviour dear" was inspired while he was watching a glorious sunset in a distant valley. In 1835 John Keble was appointed to the living at Hursley, and it is to the tune 'Hursley' that the above hymn is mostly sung.

Another favourite of his so often sung at weddings is "The voice that breathed o'er Eden, That earliest wedding day". His greatest memorial is Keble College Oxford, founded in 1868 and in which building hangs Holman Hunt's glorious painting 'The Light of the World'.

Very few men have received such affectionate tributes as have been paid to Henry Francis Lyte, an English clergyman who has lain in his tomb at Nice since 1847. Among the hymns that he wrote was 'Abide with me'. He wrote it the night that he preached his last sermon, thinking not of that night's repose, but of his eternal rest. Now the hymn is sung at the close of evening service in church and chapel all over the world.

THOMAS MERRITT - Cornish Composer 1863-1908.

Thomas Merritt, famous as the Cornish composer of carols sung all over the world where Cornishmen have settled, was my second cousin, the cousin of my father William Merritt. The Merritts were tin and copper miners in the district near Illogan. Thomas died in 1908 aged 46. My father died in 1907 at the early age of 38, having moved from Illogan to Caradon and then to the Treveddow mine at Warleggan.

He was buried in Warleggan churchyard. He died from dust on the lungs which probably also caused Thomas' early death. Life was very hard for miners in the Nineteenth and early Twentieth Centuries and many were forced to emigrate overseas in times of depression to work in mines in America, South Africa and Australia and nearer home in the Isle of Man.

It is wonderful to think that Thomas Merritt developed his outstanding gift as a musician in spite of the hard life he had to lead. He was educated at Pool Board School until he was 11 years old, when his father, also a miner, died and he was forced to go to work himself in Carn Brea Mine and Tolvaddon Tin streams. In spite of long hours of hard work, music was his inspiration and he longed to be a composer.

At the age of 18 he was taught music by Humphrey Broad of Redruth for six months. He gave up his work as a miner and earned his living teaching music to children in their homes. He also played the organ in Chili Road Chapel and Illogan Highway Chapel where in 1901 he was presented with a marble clock as a token of the esteem of his many friends. He also conducted orchestras and the choir of Illogan Parish Church.

He is best known for his carols for which he had a special gift, but he also composed oratorios, anthems, hymns and a sacred cantata. He also wrote music for brass and silver bands including a march for the Coronation of Edward VII in 1902. All his music was written in his cottage by candlelight.

His carols are best known and loved and are sung in Cornwall every Christmas. They have been broadcast by the B.B.C. and have been sung overseas.

His nephew Merritt Avers of California wrote in a letter that he had heard his uncle's carols sung deep underground in the mines of California. The Grass Valley Cornish Carol Singers are a famous Californian choir who have made thousands of records of his carols.

The famous composer Malcolm Arnold greatly admired his work and in 1968 on the 60th anniversary of his death he conducted a special memorial concert in Truro Cathedral in which many of his anthems and carols were performed by massed choirs and bands.

As a tribute to Thomas Merritt, Camborne Redruth U.D.C. had a plaque placed on the wall of Illogan Highway Chapel. "This plaque has been erected by the Camborne Redruth U.D.C. to commemorate with pride and gratitude the late Thomas Merritt of this parish, once organist in the Chapel and composer of Christmas carols sung by Cornish men and women the world over".

In the churchyard at Illogan can be seen a memorial in white marble with these words on it:-

"In loving memory of Thomas Merritt
Who died April 17th, 1908 aged 46 years.
The languishing head is at rest,
It's thinking and aching are o'er,
This quiet immoveable breast
Is heaved by affliction no more."

His music will live for ever, brightening Cornish hearts down the years at Christmas time in all parts of the world.

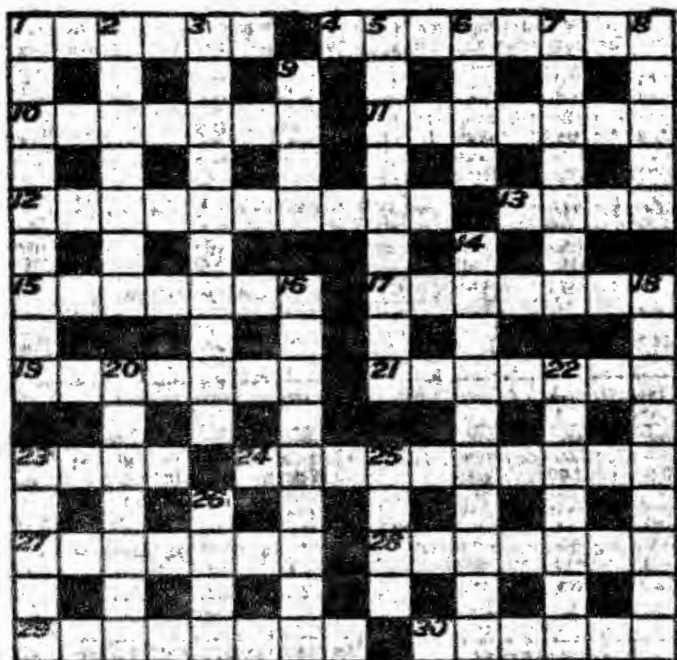
